#### **God's Guidelines for Growing Your Kids**

### (How to Love Your Children and Let Them Know It)

#### **Ephesians 6:1-4**

**Introduction:** 1) On April 26, 1989, the "Queen of Comedy", Lucille Ball, passed away. Some time before her death she was interviewed on television by talk show host, Merv Griffin, who asked Lucy some very <u>interesting</u> and <u>important</u> questions:

"Lucille, you've lived a long time on this earth and you are a wise person.

What's happened to our country? What's wrong with our children? Why are our families falling apart? What's missing?"

To those series of questions Lucy quickly responded and said:

"Papa's missing. Things are falling apart because Papa's gone. If Papa were here, he could fix it."

- 2) Lucy was right. In <u>1960</u> only <u>18%</u> of children in America lived separated from their biological daddy. Today almost <u>40%</u> live in a home where their daddy is not present. <u>80%</u> of all African-American children will spend part of their childhood separated from their father (6-19-99). Yes in too many homes Papa is gone.
- 3) And yet there is another tragedy that stalks our land that comes alongside this one, a tragedy that often afflicts Christian homes as well. There are homes where dad is present physically, but not personally and emotionally. He is not really

there. He is tuned out and checked out, and doesn't have a clue about what is going on in the lives of his children.

4) I think the sorrow and heartbreak experienced by far too many children was expressed well in a letter written to *Seventeen* Magazine. Listen to what this teenager girl said for all the world to hear about her relationship with her daddy:

Have you ever heard of a father who won't talk to his daughter? My father doesn't seem to know I'm alive. In my whole life he has never said he loves me or given me a goodnight kiss unless I asked him to.

I think the reason he ignores me is because I'm so boring. I look at my friends and think, "If I were funny like Jill or a super brain like Sandy or even outrageous and punk like Tasha, he would put down his paper and be fascinated."

I play the recorder, and for the past three years I've been a soloist in the fall concert at school. Mom comes to the concerts, but Dad never does. This year, I'm a senior, so it's his last chance. I'd give anything to lookout into the audience and see him there. But who am I kidding? It will never happen. ["The Trouble with Dad" *Seventeen* (10-85) p. 38].

5) I do not wish to overstate the situation but...knowing your mom and dad care and knowing they will be there when you need them can sometimes be the difference between life and death for a child!

I read this story in *Focus on the Family's* monthly magazine several years ago. It had run earlier in *Reader's Digest*, and is one of the most powerful stories I have ever read concerning the difference the love of a daddy made in the life of one of his children.

One day, a father took his two elementary school-age children for a ride in a pontoon boat. They were traveling down the river when suddenly the motor stopped. When the father looked behind him, he noticed something familiar about the red sweater tangled up in the propeller. Then his young son yelled, "Sherry, fell in!"

In horror, the father saw his little girl entwined in the propeller of the boat. She was submerged just beneath the surface of the water, looking straight into the eyes of her daddy and holding her breath.

He jumped into the water and tired to pull the motor up, but the heavy engine wouldn't budge. Time was running out. Desperately, the father filled his own lungs with air and dipped below the surface, blowing air into his daughter's lungs.

After giving her air three times, the father took a knife from his shocked son's hand. He quickly cut the red sweater from the propeller and lifted his daughter into the boat. Although she had survived, her

deep cuts and bruises needed medical attention, so they rushed her to the hospital.

When the crisis was over, the doctors and nurses asked the girl, "How come you didn't panic?"

"Well, we've grown up on the river and my dad always taught us that if you panic, you die. And besides, I knew my daddy would come and get me."

Do your children know beyond a shadow of a doubt that you would come and get them, no matter what? If he was busted in a <u>drug</u> raid, would you go and get him? If she got caught being a <u>prostitute</u>, would you go get your little girl? If your son was <u>drunk</u> on <u>skid row</u>, would you disown him? *Focus on the Family*, May 1996, p. 1.

### 12 Ways To Love Your Children And Let Them Know It

- 1) Get down on their level and enter their world.
  - I call this "Incarnational Parenting" (Example of Jesus-Phil 2:5-11).
  - Illustration of the little boy whose turtle died and dad's idea of a turtle funeral/party!

#### 2) Love Your Mate

- Ephesians 5:25: "Husbands love your wives, as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her."
- Titus 2:4: "And so train the young women to love their husbands and children."

OGreat partners make great parents (Love and Security)

# 3) Give them discipline

- Proverbs 13:24: "Whoever spares the rod hates his son, but he who loves him is diligent to discipline him."
- Proverbs 29:15: "The rod and reproof give wisdom, but a child left to himself brings shame to his mother."
  - o Where are the boundaries? Can I have my way?

- Illustration: Jon Akin stepping into the bathroom.
- o Big playing field not a little box
  - Honor faithfulness, trustworthiness and obedience
- o Adjust the way we discipline as they grow older

### 4) Look at them with your eyes

- Proverbs 20:12: "The hearing ear and the seeing eye, the LORD has made them both."
  - o Lady in Dallas who had "mean eyes."
- Next to your tongue, one of your most powerful means of communication is your eyes!

### 5) Touch them

- Ecclesiastes 3:5: [There is] a time to embrace..."

  - OMom's and their teenage boys

  - o"Put that down. Stop that right now. Shut up. I don't care what you are doing, come here right now. Listen to me, give me that. Don't touch that. Go away. Leave me alone. Can't you see I'm busy? Not like that stupid. Boy, that was really dumb. Can't you do anything right? You'd lose your head if it wasn't screwed on. Hurry up, we don't have all day. What's the matter with you? Can't you hear anything? I don't know what I'm going to do with you!

Recently, a woman grabbed my arm at a conference after I had finished speaking on the enormous need we all have for affirmation.

"Dr. Trent, may I tell you my story?" she asked. "Actually, it's a story of something my son did with my granddaughter that illustrated what you've been talking about—the importance of affirmation."

"My son has two daughters, one who's five and one who is in the 'terrible twos'." When a grandmother says this child is in the 'terrible twos'," believe me, she is!

"For several years, my son has taken the oldest girl out for a 'date' time, but he had never taken the two-year-old until recently. On his first 'date' with the younger one, he took her out to breakfast at a local fast food restaurant."

"They had just gotten their pancakes and my son decided it would be a good time to tell this child how much he loved and appreciated her."

"Jenny," her son had said, "I want you to know how much I love you, and how special you are to Mom and me. We prayed for you for

years, and now that you're here and growing up to be such a wonderful girl, we couldn't be more proud of you."

Once he had said all this, he stopped talking and reached over for his fork to begin eating...but he never got the fork to his mouth.

His daughter reached out her little hand and laid it on her father's hand. His eyes went to hers, and in a soft, pleading voice she said, "Longer, Daddy...longer."

He put down his fork and proceeded to tell her some more reasons and ways they loved and appreciated her, and then he again reached for his fork. A second time...and a third...and a fourth time he heard the words, "Longer, Daddy...longer."
